To say this is not the year we envisioned is a huge understatement. We came into the roles of President and Vice-President with optimism for what we hoped to achieve for the student body, as a society and as young professionals ourselves. To begin with, everything seemed relatively smooth sailing! Our committee members were eager and committed, the new crop of first years were enthusiastic, and relations with sponsors and the Adelaide Dental School were on track. And yet, the events surrounding COVID-19 and its management significantly impacted every single aspect of running the AUDSS.

Meetings that were something of a formality in the past such as those with the Dean and Head of School and the ADH General Manager had new meaning in attempting to traverse this uncharted territory in 2020. We must thank our Dean, Professor Richard Logan, as well as the BDS Program Coordinator, Associate Professor Dimitra Lekkas, for becoming a fortnightly fixture on the calendar during the height of COVID-19 in SA. Additionally, thank you to the SADS staff and the Australian Dental Association for maintaining contact throughout the teaching break. These meetings showed us more than anything that these pre-established relationships are critical for times of crisis to ensure the voice of the students is heard and the student body can be adequately supported. While nerve racking for us, we appreciate the time given by the individuals but also the respect shown to us by everyone we met with.

Like most students, we were all extremely disappointed to miss out on the usual major events; e.g. WEP Dent Camp, pub-crawls and Grand Dental Ball to name a few. However, we can wholeheartedly say that the committee went above and beyond to continuously adapt to the ever changing COVID-19 restrictions. The limitations imposed by the pandemic forced the team to become more creative with their delivery of events. Community Aid ran a very successful Sleepout in support of Common Ground Dental Clinic, Publications started a podcast, Events had a movie night and Student Affairs had a plethora of lectures, study clubs and buddy events. In some cases, the move to online has diversified the way in which students can access content, demonstrating far higher engagement than previously seen at in person events. Following positive student feedback, we hope that the AUDSS can continue to provide online delivery of content where possible, particularly as more of our students embark on placements than ever before.

In addition to losing events and face to face teaching, the impact of COVID-19 on society and business in general meant that many of our usual sponsors were no longer in a position to support the AUDSS financially. While this lead to some creative budgeting and prize giving tactics, we must thank our major sponsors Wright Evans Partners (WEP), Guild Insurance and ADASA for their support this year. 
Day 912: Still no common room

Thanks to my committee this year, who I'm sure must be exhausted with all the work I've given them and thanks to all of you who have engaged with the sponsors in any way, shape or form.




